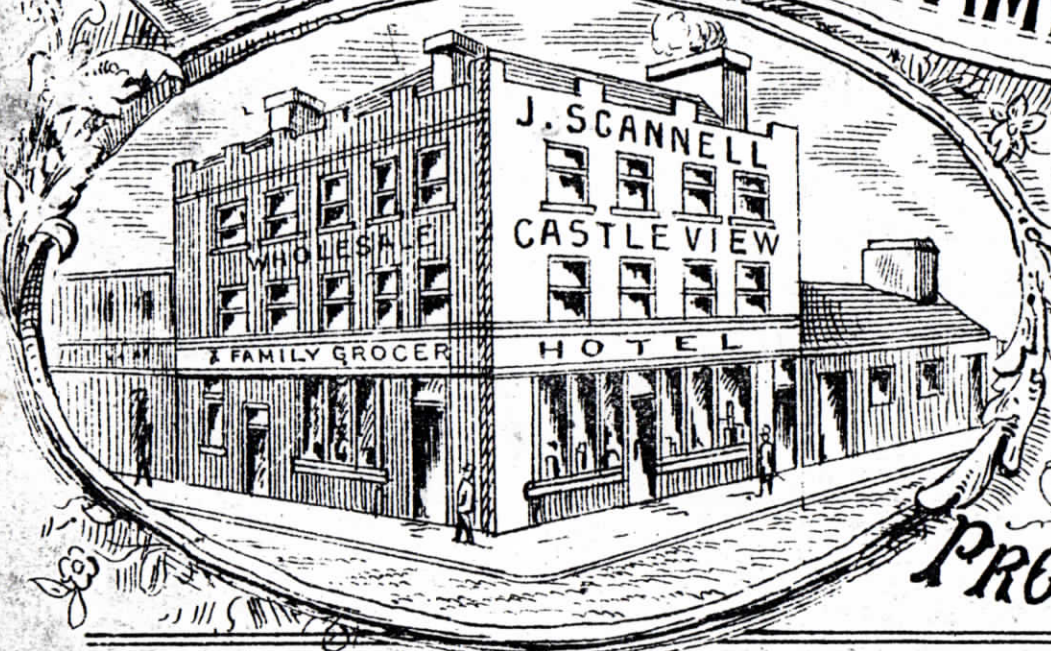

INJURY TO A CHILD.

Edmund Sullivan, of Castleisland, prosecuted Jeremiah Scannell, hotel keeper, for £50 damages for the negligence of the defendant's servant in injuring plaintiff's child on the 3rd April last.

Mr. O'H. McCowan appeared for the plaintiff, and Mr. Wade (instructed by Mr. Lennie) defended.

Margaret Duggan said the plaintiff's little daughter was bringing chips to her house on this evening. A car drove down the street very quickly, and she called out to those in the car that the child was killed. The horse struck the girl and threw her on the road. When she was picked up her face, hands and knees were bleeding.

Ellen Sullivan, the mother of the child, deposed to the condition of the child after the accident; she was in bed for a fortnight afterwards.

In cross-examination, she said she received ten shillings from the gentlemen who were on the car.

John Duggan, a carpenter, swore the horse came along "at a good fast step;" he saw the child knocked down, and on measuring it he found the child was six or seven feet from the footpath at the time, and at that point the road is wide.

Mr. Richard Latchford, J.P., said he was on the car that day, and had been to see some of his friends, as it was the day before the election at Tralee Union. The horse was going at a brisk trot at the time. He was of opinion the driver was driving carefully. Just at the time of the accident he laid his hand on the reins, but the driver had pulled up at the time. The street at the time was greatly crowded with children, and he thought the driver was more careful at the time than he had been ten minutes previously. He appeared to be perfectly sober.

To Mr. Wade—He would certainly say this was an inevitable accident.

To the Judge—He thought the child, who was very small and feeble, was trying to cross the road.

Dr. Harold said he saw the child after the accident, and found the skin cracked on two or three of the fingers, and the nose somewhat swollen. There was no injury to any of the limbs.

William Murphy the driver swore he was sober on the occasion, and when he entered the town he drove easily. Just as the car came up the child started to run across the road.

TRALEE JULY FAIR.—MONDAY.

The fair was small and the buyers were few. Fat cattle, of which not many were offered, realized a fair price; fat heifers, £10 to £12; good two-year-olds, £1 to £2; good yearlings, £4 to £6; sheep, few in market, 6d to 7d per lb, and lambs, 12s to 25s each.

DROWNED WHILE BATHING.

A boy named Thomas Walsh, aged sixteen, was drowned while bathing at Ballyarkane, near Keel, on Sunday. The river where the unfortunate youth went to bath was very shallow, but it is thought he was drawn into a whirlpool from which he was unable to escape. An inquest was held to-day by Dr. John R. Hayes, District Coroner, and a jury who returned a verdict of death from drowning. Deep sympathy is evinced for the family of the deceased.
