Nagging to an observance of the law is the surest spur to a breach of it.

LENTEN REGULATIONS IN THE DIOCESE OF KERRY, A.D., 1882.

1. By the general Law of the Church, the Faithful are obliged to fast on one meal on all days of Lent, except Sundays. Besides the chief meal, a collation is allowed by usage.

From this law are exempt persons under the age of twenty-one, and those who are feeble from old age; women pregnant or nursing; those whose state of life obliges them to bodily labour, and the poor who cannot provide a complete and substantial meal.

2. The general Law of the Church prohibits the use of flesh meat during the forty days of Lent. By virtue of power granted to Us by the Holy See, we allow during this Lent the use of flesh meat at dinner on Mondays, Tuesdays, Thursdays and Saturdays, except Saturday in Ember week (4th March.)

3. Meat and fish cannot be used at the same meal.

4. White meats, as butter, cheese, &c, and eggs may be taken on all days of this Lent except Ash Wednesday and Good Friday.

5. By dispensation granted to Us by the Holy See, lard and dripping may be used as a condiment in dressing fish, herbs, &c, on all days on which butter is allowed.

6. If delicate health or other just cause render further dispensations necessary. Parish Priests and all Confessors are hereby empowered to grant them.

7. On Ash Wednesday there will be Mass and distribution of the Blessed Ashes in the principal Churches.

8. A Plenary Indulgence can be gained on the usual conditions by those who make their Easter Duty between the first day of Lent and Low Sunday.
