

- 1822 The insurrection act was in total owing to the recently disturbed state of the country. There were large garrisons in Newmarket Kesh Millstreet Castleisland Listowel Abbeyfeale Glin Newcastle Down Collesker + Kiscarroll. Griffith 8.94 S.6 King
- 1680<sup>s</sup> It was felt that a company of troops quartered in Castleisland would benefit the town and keep control over the local rebels of "Tories".
