

SHOPKEEPERS RAIDED FOR ARMS

RAID FOR ARMS IN CASTLEISLAND.

Castleisland, Saturday.

This morning at one o'clock a large number of police, under command of Sub Inspector Taylor, made a raid on the houses of John K. O'Connor, draper; Jeremiah Nolan, egg merchant; Edward Wren, merchant; Timothy Horan, publican, and late secretary of the local branch of the Land League; John F. Riordan, publican; John Harrington, publican; and Terence Brosnan, shopkeeper. After being done with the town search they proceeded to the country and searched the houses of Mr. P. D. Kenny, ex-suspect and vice-chairman of the Tralee Board of Guardians; and Edmund Hussey, ex-suspect. I feel happy to state that their searches proved fruitless and am under the impression the constabulary must have received false information for a hoax as these above shopkeepers are most respectable men, and never known to take part in any unlawful act.—Cox.

REPORTED ARRESTS IN KERRY.

Bradford, Monday.

The meagre accounts I have at hand fail to show whether or not any treasonable documents, arms, or ammunition, were captured by the authorities. The arrests were effected very quietly by a body of police under the command of a sub Inspector. They are in custody.—Cox.
