**YOUNG IRELAND SOCIETY.**  
At a committee meeting of the Young Ireland Society, which was held at their rooms in Upper Castle, on Monday evening, the following resolution was adopted:—  
"That as this Society is open to all decent townsmen who wish to become members, and as the weekly instalment (which amounts only to the small sum of 3d) is within the power of any person to pay. Be it resolved that any person found intruding in the Society's rooms (who is not a member) after the date of this resolution, will be ejected by force, except he be invited by some member of the Society, or through a notice in the public Press; and as our Society Hall has been the rendezvous of drunkard and loafers on Sundays in the past, a state of affairs which have reflected the highest discredit on the members of the Society, and a public nuisance to the proprietor, Mr Daniel Nolan. It is further resolved that any non-member found standing in the hall or street-door leading to the Society rooms, will be asked to leave immediately, and in the event of his refusing to do so, the members will be put to the painful extremity of having him removed by a constable."  
It was also decided to hold a meeting on Sunday, the 5th inst, at 8.30 p.m, for the purpose of making arrangements for the Allen, Larkin and O'Brien procession, and that the different trade societies and other bodies, be asked to attend.

**DEATH AND FUNERAL OF THE LATE MR. MAURICE BRICK, CAHERBREAGH.**  
It is with much regret we have to announce the death of Mr. Maurice Brick, Caherbreagh, which sad occurrence took place at his residence on Saturday evening at the ripe age of 50 years. Mr. Brick for many years of his life was prominently connected with the Tralee Board of Guardians, and in that capacity, as in all others, he always displayed ability, good judgment, and an unshaken determination to do and say what he considered just, irrespective of any influence. Though in the space of 80 years there is plenty room to err, I doubt if any man, past or present, could ever say that Maurice Brick did a mean act. Few men have indeed succeeded so fully and justly in attaining the appellation of "an honest man" as did the late Mr. Brick. Straight in stature as in honour, Mr. Brick was a typical representative of the good old stock, now almost extinct. The deceased gentleman was father of the Rev. J. Brick, P.P., Fossa, Killarney; Rev. J. Brick, C.C., Castlegregory; Dr. Brick, Tralee, and Mr. William Brick, Caherbreagh. The funeral which took place on Monday was largely attended, and testified to the high respect in which the deceased gentleman and the different members of his family were held by the public at large, irrespective of creed or politics. The chief mourners were—Rev. J. Brick, P.P., Fossa; Rev. J. Brick, C.C., Castlegregory; Dr. Brick, Tralee; Wm. Brick, Caherbreagh.
